### TEXAS MUNICIPAL COURTS FACE OF JUSTICE

#### BUILDING TRUST AND CONFIDENCE THROUGH MODEL COURT WEBSITES & SIGNAGE







In 2018, the Texas Municipal Courts Education Center (Austin, Texas) received a grant from the State Justice Institute (Reston, Virginia) to work with the Center for Court Innovation (New York, New York) to develop models of effective websites and court signage that reflect the concepts of procedural justice. This brochure provides information about that project and where Texas municipal judges and court support personnel can access the tool kits, exemplary webpages, and sample signage.

The project was guided by the evidence-based literature on the concept of procedural fairness (also referred to as procedural justice), which focuses on whether people experiencing the justice system perceive the procedures (and their treatment) as fair. The four key components of procedural fairness are as follows: Understanding, Voice, Respect, and Neutrality. How courts communicate with the public - both inside and outside of the courtroom - can be directly linked to these principles.


# BUILDING PUBLIC TRUST AND CONFIDENCE THROUGH MODEL COURT WEBSITES



## IF WALLS COULD TALK: CAN BETTER COURT SIGNS HELP BUILD PUBLIC TRUST?




